# **Grant puts Ennis on its bike**

ENNIS is set to ride on, with €650,000 in funding for the development of improved cycling facilities. The grant is being allocated to develop cycle lanes, bike parking, road and junction improvements, information signs and awareness-raising projects in Ennis.

The project is part of the National Cycle Policy Framework and Smarter Travel, A Sustainable Transport Future, the main aim being to make it easier, safer and more accessible to cycle in Ennis.

The funding will be spent in Ennis on improving junctions; creating three new town cycling zones, with maximum speeds of 30 km/hr, giving more priority to the cyclist; three new cycle routes; cycle parking spots and new signs giving cycling times and distances on the main routes of the town. Some of the fund will also be spent on improving awareness of

Travel Workplaces scheme and all schools in the Ennis area will get support and coaching to get children involved in the Green Flag programme.

Three routes have been chosen for cycle lanes. The Tulla Road to Gort RD R352 route will connect the big housing estates on the Tulla Road with the big

The grant was announced under the Active Travel Towns Programme by Minister of State for Transport, Alan Kelly TD, this week. Labour election candidate for the Ennis area, Seamus Ryan commented, "It's great to see Ennis developing a much more joined-up cycling network around our town, instead of the 5km that exists at the moment. There is the potential to triple that to 15km, connecting the places where people live and work with the amenities of the town.

### €350,000 spending spree for Kilrush

KILRUSH Town Council has been given the go-ahead, by the Department of Environment and Local Government, to spend €350,000 from the council's capital resources on upgrading Cappa playground and developing an astroturf pitch on the Cooraclare Road in the town.

The funds had been set aside by Kilrush Town Council throughout the years and had been earmarked for various projects. However, to get approval to spend the money on the playground and astroturf projects, the council had to apply to the department to obtain permission. "The money will go to-wards the development of

the first phase of the astro-turf pitch. The project was tendered last year and a local contractor is lined up with the hope to start the works immediately," Ian Lynch said. Councillor

He said the availability of the money for the upgrade of Cappa playground was also a significant boost. A committee was formed

in 2010, along with development plans to upgrade the playground at Cappa but funding was not available. I have campaigned for this development and have drawn up several layouts, plans and tenders. The works were tendered and are in the process of being reviewed with the intention to start immediately. Hopefully, the play-ground will be open by early summer," he added, before noting that some projects had failed to secure funding. "I acknowledge that several representations have been made by groups, highlighting very worthy projects. Unfor-

tunately, the spending of capital funds can only be undertaken on council projects and this decision rests with in the Department of Environment and Local Government," the Independent local election candidate concluded.
